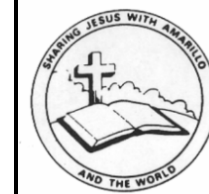

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They're All But Gone

The other day I heard on the news that in Great Britain the last veteran of what is known as the "Great War" has died. That would be what we call World War I. I also heard that here in the United States there is now only one survivor of that war.

Many may not know that it was an Iowan who was among the first three killed from the United States and by many accounts the first to die in the Great War to end all wars. His name was Merle David Hay.

Those that knew him are probably dead and gone. He was just a young man when he died. Before the war he led an ordinary life and was a clerk in an implement dealership. I'm assuming he was enthusiastic as a young man. He volunteered for the service. Remembering that age myself, he most likely didn't give much of a second thought that he could be killed. When you're young you don't think of those things. Those thoughts come with age and wisdom.

He was in Company F, 16th Infantry Regiment, 1st Infantry Division. This outfit was in trenches near the village of Bathelemont les Bauzemont in Lorraine, France. They were assigned to an area that was considered a safe zone. However, the German army had other plans. He died in hand-to-hand combat there in the trench during a surprise raid November 3, 1917.

I'm sure he did not set out to die, nor was he expecting to be remembered in honor. It wasn't anything spectacular that he did that caused him this fame. Many, many thousands of others died in battle under the same circumstances. The fact was that he was the first American to die.

The Bible says *"For scarcely for a righteous man will one die; for peradventure for the good man some one would even dare to die"* (Rom. 5:7). I'm assuming he was doing what he thought was right and not out to make a name for himself.

Now Jesus, on the other hand, knew His mission in life from the start. We know that it troubled Him greatly. *"Let this cup pass from me"* (Matt. 26:39). Yet, when He prayed, it was that God's will be done. In Matt. 26:42, *"...except I drink it thy will be done."* Jesus had the weight of the world on His shoulders, the sins of the world.

"But God commendeth His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. Much more than, being now justified by his blood, shall we be saved from the wrath of God through him" (Rom 5:8-9).

Not for the wealthy, not for the famous, not for the mighty, although they're included, but for the sinners—you and me—Jesus died.

Merle Hay died and is remembered for what happened to him. Jesus died and is continually redeeming us today for who we are—sinners in need of salvation. Our task is to be obedient.
